To apply for and/or receive a scholarship, you must:

- (a) Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Assistance) Application.
- (b) Be admitted to at least one accredited: college/university/postsecondary technical college

NOTE: Seniors enrolled in the Jump Start Scholarship Program are eligible to apply for the donor-sponsored scholarships, but not for the Booster Club scholarships.

Process:

- 1. On or by Monday, March 16, 2026, please submit to Ms. Armstrong in the Guidance office the following:
 - a. Your completed application (only the attached, fill-able form (pages 2-4) will be accepted). Applications with hand-written responses will not be accepted.
 - b. Supporting documents (including digital images confirming FAFSA completion and college acceptance).
 - c. Other supporting documents (letters of recommendation, award certificates, other)
- 2. In early April, all applicants will participate in a 15-minute interview with members of the Scholarship Committee.
- 3. Overall, seven criteria are rated (on a 5-point scale) by the Committee when assessing each student's application, supporting documents, and interview. The evaluation criteria include: (a) academic merit, (b) financial need, (c) extra-curricular involvement (in-school and out-of-school), (d) community service, (e) personal essay, (f) interview, and (g) citizenship and attendance.
- 4. All information provided in your application and interview will be held in strict confidence. All notes and applications will be shredded once the review is completed.
- 5. In early May, the graduates selected to receive scholarships will receive award letters via email or text.
- 6. Scholarship award certificates will be presented in late May during the Community Awards Ceremony.

After saving this document to your hard drive, please complete it. Consider asking others to proofread your application, and to suggest changes and edits. Comments on the personal essay can be especially helpful.

- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.
